The Highland Lakes Democratic Women gathered Thursday, February 28, at Meadowlakes Restaurant for their monthly business meeting and luncheon.

Nancy Hill, chapter President, recognized four HLDW members who were honored with Star Awards at the recent Texas Democratic Women state convention. The Star Award is presented to women who have made significant contributions to their local chapters. HLDW recipients are Marjorie Dearmont, Mary Doran, Paula d'Orsogna and Marti Pogue.

Hill reminded the group that supporting candidates in local elections is a key goal for 2019. She recognized two chapter members who currently hold elected office in the Highland Lakes area – Mary

Ann Raesener, Mayor of Meadowlakes, and Jane Scheidler, City Council Member in Bertram.

Barbara Baruch, chapter Vice President, issued a rousing call to members to run for local office as she introduced guest speakers Philippa Wood, Training Director and Cliff Walker, Deputy Director of the Texas Democratic Party. Wood and Walker discussed considerations for women contemplating a run. They addressed concerns many women have that make them hesitant to pursue political office, and shared the type and variety of resources the Party offers to support candidates. The Party's support extends to city, county and school district positions, whether partisan or nonpartisan. They echoed Baruch's challenge to members to consider running at the local level.

# **Hill Country Chapter March Meeting**

**Please join Hill Country TDW members for their Tuesday, March 5 meeting**at the Ray and Joan Kroc Center, Holdsworth Drive in Kerrville, beginning at 11:00 a.m. Acclaimed author and member of the board of directors of Equality Texas, Jo Ivester, will speak from her own experience to address "Why Equality Texas Matters: A Story of a Family with a Transgender Son." She will also present an overview of Equality Texas' work in the legislature to address current challenges and opportunities facing the LGBTQ community.

Ivester speaks to a wide range of audiences, from small book clubs to entire schools, using her personal stories as a means to make people more comfortable with those who are different from them with regard to race, religion, sexual orientation, and gender identification. Her 2015 work, *The Outskirts of Hope*, is a moving, inspirational memoir about how living and working in an all-black town during the height of the civil rights movement profoundly affected the author's entire family—and how they in turn impacted the community.

She holds a bachelor of science in civil engineering from MIT and an MBA from Stanford University. She worked for many years in transportation and operations management before teaching as an adjunct professor in the business school of St. Edward's University in Austin, Texas. Mother and grandmother, she and her husband live in Austin.

Among Ivester's accolades are the Wall Street Journal Best-Seller List for non-fiction e-books; NPR Selection for its National Weekly Feature, Author's Corner; Writers' League of Texas Best Non-fiction for 2015; 2015 National Indie Excellence Award for Autobiography; Jewish Book Council Non-fiction Book of the Week in December, 2016; Kirkus, Booklist, and Story Circle Reviews and 2015-2016 Sarton Women's Book Award; silver medal for memoirs.

A book-signing will follow the meeting.
