The SDEC adopted new rules at its most recent meeting to allow the party to conduct the state convention at a distance by electronic means. It also means that many, many more Democrats will be able to participate as visitors in the range of training, panels and caucus presentations than "just" the 11,000 plus who are official delegates. Staying Connected

Do

- MUTE yourself -Background noise can be a distraction.
- WEAR appropriate clothing - Avoid mishaps like no pants on national TV.
- INTRODUCE yourself before you speak - There may be more people in the meeting than you can see from the first screen.



Don't

- DELAY your start time -Meetings do not start unless the host logs on so be respectful of your viewers time.
- MULTI-TASK Viewers can tell when you are not focused or checking an email.
- INTERRUPT other speakers - There is a chat box to ask questions or ask for the floor.

Hill Country Texas Democratic Women highlighted women in leadership positions in their article "Are Women Leaders Doing a Better Job?"

As Democratic Women, we will be focusing on electing more women to office, not just to close the gender gap, but to improve governance in our State and nation. Several news outlets, including USA Today and Forbes magazine have noticed that nations led by women are having better outcomes during the Covid-19 pandemic. Some nations to watch are Germany, New Zealand, Slovakia, and Iceland. For example, both Germany and Slovakia have much lower death rates than other European countries, and Iceland and Germany have much higher rates of testing.

In the April 10, 2020 edition of Forbes magazine, Tomas Chamorro-Premuzic made the following observation: "The performance of countries with female heads of state ...has so far been quite positive." He goes on to state that "data support the idea that women are better equipped for handling a health crisis, including a pandemic. Even if the issue at stake is just focused on a specific range of decision-making tendencies or cognitive biases, such as reckless risk-taking, overconfidence, and hubris (all of which are more common in men than women) it is intuitive to see the logic for reducing risk by increasing the number of women in charge." ~ *Stephanie Ertel, Legislative Chair*

Highland Lakes Democratic Women spotlighted member

She is the membership chair for the Highland Lake Democratic Women, which has led to her involvement with St. Frederick's Church. Evelyn is very active, along with Dan, in the VFW of Marble Falls where she is involved in the patriotic art class scholarship program for young people. At the gallery, Evelyn teaches a weekly watercolor class and is the special events chair.
